I'm pleased to be able to confirm that Haringey Council is proposing to freeze your council tax for the fourth year running next year.

We are one of the first London boroughs to have made the commitment to hold council tax at current levels, and it would make 2013/14 the fourth consecutive year of council tax freeze for Haringey residents.

Your council tax makes up around one quarter of our annual budget and is a vital part of helping us to deliver services across the borough. But we recognise how important it is to balance that against the need to do what we can, where we can, to ease the pressure on local families.

We're well aware, from our conversations and contact with so many of you, that the economic climate is making things really tough for people living in Haringey.

Recent figures released by the Office for National Statistics showed that incomes have fallen by an average of 13 per cent since the start of the economic crisis. Add to that the soaring costs of rent, heating, power, petrol and public transport and we know that the impact is devastating for thousands of families.

We know that council tax isn't the only living cost that local people have to worry about, but we don't want to add to the burden.

The freeze will mean that the average family in Haringey will save around £35 per year compared to an inflation-level rise of 3 per cent on the council's element of the tax. Over four years, this saving represents more than £140.

Our proposal to freeze council tax forms part of our 2013/14 budget consultation, and we welcome your views on this and other budget issues facing the council.

Our final budget will be set by Full Council in February, and our spending decisions will be shaped by our commitment as a council to our key priorities of working with local businesses to create jobs; delivering regeneration to Haringey; improving school standards and outcomes for young people; tackling housing challenges, and delivering the very best quality services to residents.

Wishing a very happy Christmas and New Year to everyone in Haringey.

'Dragons' Den' achievements for Tottenham youth

A team of Tottenham young entrepreneurs were joined by Mayor of Haringey Cllr David Browne to celebrate their graduation from a 'Dragons' Den' style business school.

The 26 students took part in the Tottenham Young Entrepreneurs Summer Camp, which challenged them to work in teams to develop new business ventures for community benefit and pitch their ideas to a 'Dragons' Den' of business people.

Each of the young people has since been awarded adult professional qualifications accredited by the Chartered Management Institute (CMI).

Cllr Browne said: "The ideas generated by these motivated young people were excellent and greatly impressed me and the other so called dragons when we judged the business portfolios."

Keeping Haringey moving this winter

Haringey Council has topped up salt stores and made more roads a top priority for gritting this winter.

During severe weather, resources will be focused on keeping major roads and traffic routes flowing, and schools open.

The council's Winter Service Plan will see it carry out overnight frost patrols of key routes when near zero temperatures are expected.

Rock salt supplies are at capacity and will be monitored throughout the winter. More than 150 grit bins for community use will be replenished as often as supplies allow.

Residents are also encouraged to get their own supplies of salt in case of emergencies.

Community partnership for Finsbury Park

Plans to allow an organisation of local sports groups to run sports facilities at Finsbury Park have taken a step closer.

Haringey Council's Cabinet has agreed to progress proposals to lease the track and gym and tennis courts to the Finsbury Park Sports Partnership.

The partnership – which brings together London Heathside Athletics Club; London Blitz American Football Club; Dynamic Sports Academy, and Access to Sport – hopes to manage and improve the running track, gym and tennis courts; refurbish facilities, and encourage more people to get involved in sport.

In addition to improving facilities for tennis, athletics and American football, the partnership also has plans for football, fitness training and rugby.

A final Agreement to Lease will be considered by the council in the New Year and would be subject to the Partnership:

- Achieving charity status
- Securing £1.3m of external funding
- Gaining planning permission for improvements
- Carrying out works in line with the funding

School scoops travel award

Bounds Green School has been honoured for travel plans that encourage parents to ditch the car and walk or cycle with their children to school.

The school received a TfL Silver Award for School Travel Plans and was named a Beacon School for setting high standards for other schools to follow.

School Business Manager Faye Papini led on the project, using school travel plans to help identify ways of safely bringing children to school without using cars.

The school works with Haringey Council's Smarter Travel Team to provide a programme of road safety activities and road safety

measures for pupils.

Every school in Haringey is asked to devise a travel plan, which is used by council road safety officers as a guide to see what measures – such as crossings or traffic calming – might be introduced to encourage walking or cycling to school.



Bus stop trial underway

A trial bus stop is in operation in Muswell Hill to see whether easier access can be offered to and from The Broadway.

The six-month trial will see the W7 bus start its journey towards Crouch End and Finsbury Park from outside Boots chemist, on the north side of the roundabout.

The new stop will offer passengers level access to buses and remove the need to walk down the top slope of Muswell Hill to catch the W7.

It comes after access problems were highlighted following the opening of Hornsey Health Centre in Park Road, with some elderly and disabled residents finding it difficult to get to their GP on public transport.

The six-month trial, in partnership with TfL, will assess whether it is safe and practical for the W7 to operate from the new stop permanently. The trial stop will only serve the southbound

route W7, which stops at the Health Centre. The bus stop for the 144 will not change at the moment.

Haringey marks Remembrance Sunday

Residents from across the borough came together on Remembrance Sunday to pay their respects to those who have given their lives in conflict.

The Friday before Remembrance Day saw a special schools' service with local pupils at the War Memorial in the Garden of Remembrance in Tottenham Cemetery, White Hart Lane.

On Remembrance Day itself, dozens of local residents, service people and councillors also took time to pay their respects, joining special services and sharing in a minute's silence in remembrance of all those who have died serving the country in two World Wars as well as in more recent conflicts.

At Hornsey War Memorial, Park Road, the Middlesex Regiment Association and Hornsey Cadets laid wreaths before attending a service at St Mary with St George Church.

Services were also held at Wood Green War Memorial, Wood Green High Road (pictured) and at the Tottenham War memorial, Tottenham Town Hall, following a church service at Holy Trinity Church.

Dog control orders

Dog control orders will come into force borough-wide from January.

Under the control orders, dogs will be banned from all children's playgrounds and marked sports pitches; it will be an offence to not clean up after a dog; owners will be required to keep pets on a lead where they are out or control or causing a nuisance, and dogs will need to be kept on a lead in certain areas.

Those who breach the orders will face a fixed penalty notice.

Following 10 years of community effort and millions of pounds investment from the Heritage Lottery Fund and Haringey Council, thousands of residents celebrated the regeneration of Tottenham's largest park.

More than £5million construction works have delivered a new flower-lined channel for the Moselle River; a loop bike track; an environmental building with café and classroom; refurbishment of the Shell Theatre; restoration of the historic model traffic area; new meadows, flower-beds and tree planting, and improvements to drainage, paths and entrances.

The Lordship Rec Community Festival was a whirl of activity, with sport, arts and

crafts, music, dance, a dog show, flower and produce display, city farm animals, local history, cream teas and dozens of picnics. Haringey People was there to capture the festivities, organised by the Lordship Rec Users' Forum.

Forum Chair Dave Morris said: "This community-led regeneration project has demonstrated what can be achieved when residents' own visions for the future are backed by the resources and support we need. We look forward to this community empowerment continuing over the next ten years as we help to manage the park in partnership with the council."



Big changes to benefits are coming next Spring – make sure you're ready

The Government will be making significant changes to benefits next year. These might mean a change to the types of benefits you receive, or to the amount of money you will be entitled to.

The reforms can seem complicated, but a guide to the changes is available on the Haringey Council website, and residents can get dedicated support and advice from the Citizens Advice Bureau.

Sharon Grant, Chair of Haringey Citizens Advice Bureau, explains:

“There is no doubt that the benefit reforms will have a big impact on many people who live in Haringey, and we want to help people prepare now for the changes that are coming next year.

“Haringey Council, CAB and other agencies are all here to help you. The changes are wide-ranging and there are some important exemptions and a gradual approach to introducing them, so we want to make sure everyone has access to the right information and advice.

“It’s good to make yourself aware of what is coming and when you might be contacted, as well as thinking about budgeting and how best to manage changes to your income and bills. We’re here to help with that.”

The biggest change is the cap (or limit) to total household benefits to match average take-home pay: £350 a week for single people and £500 a week for couples or families. Many benefits are included in the cap, which will be achieved by reducing housing benefit payments.

From April, the Government will also introduce the following key changes:

- Cutting housing benefit for working-age (16-64) social housing tenants if they have a spare bedroom
- Launching the new Personal Independence Payment (PIP) to gradually replace Disability Living Allowance (DLA) for eligible working age people
- Reducing council tax benefit by 10 per cent – meaning most working age people are likely to be asked to pay something towards council tax



An online calculator can show you how much you will be entitled to under the changes, and help you start planning for how you will manage your payments if the amount you get each week is reduced.

Here, Haringey People takes a look at just some of the highlights of a year of recovery and progress.




Bring landmark shops back to the High Road – Building work is underway at Carpetright (above) and Aldi is set to reopen before Christmas

A* for effort



The Sixth Form Centre is carving out a real niche in producing students excelling in science and maths subjects at A level, but this year our students have also achieved record breaking grades in BTECs and humanities subjects.



Bucking national trends and improving again year-on-year, Haringey's children and young people achieved better than ever exam and test results this year at GCSE, A level and Key Stage 2.

Key Stage 2

Key Stage 2 is the part of the National Curriculum studied by primary children in year groups 3-6.

Children are expected to reach certain levels of knowledge, skills and understanding. These Attainment Levels are numbered 1-8, and the expected Attainment Level for Haringey children is 4.

Haringey's 2012 Key Stage 2 provisional results:

- 77% of pupils achieved level 4 in combined English and Maths, up 6% from 2011
- 27% achieved level 5 results in combined English and Maths, up 7% from 2011
- 92% achieved the 2 levels of progress in Key Stage 2 at English, 3% above national average
- 88% achieved the 2 levels of progress in Key Stage 2 at Maths, 1% above national average

GCSEs + A Levels

Key Haringey GCSE facts:

- More students than ever achieved five or more GCSE A* to C grades, including English and maths
- Tenth year of improvement
- 74% of pupils made expected progress from Key Stage 2 English to GCSE English. The England average is 68.9%
- 77.6% of pupils made expected progress from Key Stage 2 Maths to GCSE Maths. The England average is 69.6%

St Thomas More Catholic School, Wood Green, made a massive leap with 76 per cent of pupils achieving five or more GCSE A* to C grades including English and maths, compared to 54 per cent last year.

Headteacher Martin Tissot said extra classes and structured revision programmes had paid off. He added: "Although we have a number of pupils with A and A* grades, I'm just as proud of those who have surpassed their targets."

Northumberland Park Head Teacher Monica Duncan said: "Our excellent results are a real credit to every single member of the staff, everyone's worked really hard and I'm delighted with the students and the school's success."

At A Level, the number of students achieving A* to C grades rose again this year and is now on a par with the national average.

Haringey Sixth Form Centre Principal June Jarrett said: "The Sixth Form Centre is carving out a real niche in producing students excelling in science and maths subjects at A level, but this year our students have also achieved record breaking grades in BTECs and humanities subjects."





Haringey People: Filling the Gap

Haringey People meets two Tottenham mums aiming to fill the local snack gap.

When Tottenham mums Kate King and Renee Taylor (pictured top right) used to get together with their young families, they noticed a gap for somewhere local to eat and have fun with their “sometimes noisy, messy kids”.

“We felt that there would be great demand for an informal weekday café that had a real community feel and that would provide mums just like us with a spacious place to go and eat with their kids, and eat well,” explains Kate.

Combining Kate’s love of baking and teaching experience – making her an expert at dealing with dining room rabbles – with Renee’s professional experience as a nutritional therapist, the pair founded community café ‘Filling the Gap’.

The café, based in the Salvation Army Hall on Terront Road, launched as a pop-up in March and, following a great response from the community, the Big Lottery Fund awarded the pair £6,000.

The grant is being invested in equipment and uniforms for volunteers, meaning the café can run every Friday lunchtime, with up to 60 people dropping in each week. Thursday lunch sessions will follow in the New Year.

Kate and Renee also have the backing of national charity Fareshare, which donates surplus supermarket food to help them put together an affordable menu – and allows some children to eat for free.

Renee says: “Because we never know what food we’re going to get, we have to be really creative and flexible in our approach. We are proud to always offer tasty, healthy food as well as providing a vegetarian option so that people of all

faiths (and tastes) can enjoy the service.”

Plans are afoot to reach out to other groups, such as elderly residents, and offer more to the community.

“We want to offer volunteer placements,” says Renee. “And we want to complement the role of the café as a local hub by offering community classes on nutrition and homework support.

“We’re really excited to keep thinking up ways to deliver services to the community whilst putting our own skills to good use.”

Revisiting Haringey's stylish past

The chairman of an iconic British furniture makers' looks back on 45 years in the borough.

HK Furniture (est 1933) is synonymous with the style and elegance of the best of Britain's bespoke furniture and upholstery, it was based in the very south of Haringay at the former Omega works on Hermitage Road, where the company innovated familiar designs such as the Diplomat and the Barbican.

Tottenham born Chairman Cliff Rust, who joined the company in 1960, recently donated the business archive to the Haringey Archive. He talked to Haringey People about the life of the company at their N4 HQ.

"HK furniture may have been stocked at Harrods, Heals and Maples – and been exported around the world – but from

1959 to the day we retired productions eight years ago, HK was a Haringey company through and through," explains Cliff.

"When the company took over the site at the former Omega works we began recruiting apprentices from local schools and trained them up to produce exquisite and unique pieces that went on to build our brand nationally and internationally.

"The vast majority of them stayed with HK for decades, honing their skills and becoming dedicated master craftsmen. Hermitage Road really was at the cutting edge of the best in British design for a generation."

The archive material is very visual, including photographs, brochures, drawings of original designs and even a roll of upholstery fabric. Four scrapbooks contain a wealth of images, articles and advertising campaigns that will be a wonderful source of information for

researchers of furniture design and manufacture.

"We are very proud to have inspired some excellent craftsmanship in Haringey and beyond," says Cliff. "My hope is that the archive will continue to inspire future craftsmen and women as well as highlighting the rich history of excellence in design and in industry within the borough."


