A grassroots movement initiated in response to the disparities faced by Black children in the education system, it was led by Black parents advocating for better educational opportunities, resources, and support for their children.

The event served as a timely reminder that Black history isn't just for one month of the year here in Haringey, but each and every day. Black history is an intrinsic part of our history in this borough.

The theme this year is about standing firm in pride and power, which really reflects what we're about here in Haringey – standing up for justice, standing up for people's rights, and standing together in unity with all of our communities.

That abiding sense of community cohesion came through strongly too in our activities and events to mark National Hate Crime Awareness Week (NHCAW). when our fabulous Multi-Faith Forum once again came to the fore.

Haringey has always been a warm and welcoming borough, where people of different backgrounds and beliefs have long been able to celebrate and commiserate in triumph and tragedy together.

We should rightly cherish our longstanding track record of opposing bigotry, discrimination, and racism and, in all of its forms - hate has no home in Haringey.

It was fantastic to see our residents relishing and rejoicing at the respective reopening of Muswell Hill Library and Seven Sisters Market as well.

We have invested in these popular community hubs - and future-proofed them with accessibility improvements and renovations – as we recognise just how important they are to the local people they serve.

NEW BEGINNING FOR SEVEN SISTERS MARKET



It was a day to remember for the traders, residents and Latin Village community as Seven Sisters Market hosted a party to officially re-open the iconic site.

Dancing, music and celebrations heralded a new beginning for traders returning to the site after five years. Leader Cllr Peray Ahmet, Mayor of Haringey Cllr Ahmed Mahbub and Cabinet Members joined Deputy Prime Minister and Tottenham MP David Lammy, London Assembly Member for Enfield and Haringey Joanne McCartney, traders and representatives from Places for London for the special event.

The temporary indoor and outdoor market, which is open seven days a week, houses 40 stalls, a new seating area and customer toilets.

It sells products and food from all over the world, but particularly South and Latin America, and provides services such as beauty, hairdressing, legal advice and money transfer.

A new route has been opened between Suffield Road and Seven Sisters Road, helping to improve access for the community to and from the market and the nearby Victoria line station.

CELEBRATING BLACK HISTORY

The year-long celebration of Black history and heritage in Haringey kicked off in style as residents came together for an evening of live music and performances.

The Wolves Lane Horticulture Centre played host to our Black History Haringey 365 (BHH365) launch event, as emerging and exciting local musicians and poets took centre stage.

A panel discussion reflected on the 50 years since the Black Parents Movement was established in north London, in response to the disparities faced by Black children in the education system.

The event forms part of the council's annual programme, which promotes Black history education throughout the borough and shines a light on the fascinating and diverse history of Black communities in Haringey.

The programme has over 60 events throughout the year ahead, including craft workshops, film screenings, markets, walking tours and many more creative activities for residents to explore Black history in Haringey.

CELEBRATING LIFE, LAUGHTER AND LONGEVITY AT HARINGEY'S AGE WELL FESTIVAL

Bruce Castle Park and Museum was buzzing with energy as Haringey hosted its second Age Well Festival.

This was a vibrant, inclusive event celebrating ageing, wellbeing and community connection.

From chair yoga and tai chi in the Wellbeing Zone, to creative workshops, live music and dance performances on the Main Stage, the festival offered something for everyone.

Focusing on health and staying active, there were GP talks, art therapy, walking football, Nordic walking and much more.



The festival was delivered in partnership with Public Voice and was supported by a wide range of local organisations, and volunteers. The main sponsors included Anchor Life in Place and Formation Design & Build as well as the National Lottery Community Fund and our Zone sponsors Home Instead, Lendlease and Nwando Care.

A huge thank you to everyone who helped make the day such a success and to those who came along and celebrated with us.

GREEN LIGHT FOR MORE THAN 100 COUNCIL HOMES

Haringey's pledge to deliver one of the most ambitious house-building programmes in London has taken another major step forward.

The lives of dozens of Haringey families are set to be transformed after plans to acquire and build more than 100 new council homes were given the green light.

Cabinet agreed the purchase of 76 homes as part of the redevelopment of a site at The Roundway and 32 at an existing scheme in Lordship Lane, both in Tottenham.

Councillors also gave the goahead to select a contractor to build 16 energy efficient homes in Archway Road, N6, designed using Passivhaus insulation principles.

The three projects will contribute to our target to deliver 3,000 new council homes by 2031, 2,000 of which are already underway or completed.

80 per cent of the Lordship Lane project and 40 per cent at The Roundway will be family sized accommodation of two bedrooms or more.

The Archway Road Passivhaus development, which includes 10 family-sized homes, will be powered by heat pumps and solar panels and deliver energy efficiency, ensuring low running costs for tenants.



An energy bill cut of £150 will be extended to 23,000 more households in Haringey thanks to government intervention.

Every billpayer in the borough on means-tested benefit will now qualify for the Warm Home Discount after restrictions were lifted to ease the cost of living for millions across the country.

By removing old rules, the discount on fuel costs this winter will not only support people living in poorly insulated properties but all those on benefits such as Universal Credit.

In Haringey, typically qualifying households will automatically get the one-off £150 discount applied to their bill between October and March so there is no need to apply.

If you receive a pension, getting a Warm Home Discount doesn't affect your entitlement to a Winter Fuel Payment or the Cold Weather Payment either.

FAMILIES BENEFIT FROM MAJOR INVESTMENT IN WOOD GREEN COMMON

A brand-new playground and one of the first Football Association (FA) 'Playzones' in London were unveiled at Wood Green Common as we continue to plough major investment into parks across Haringey.

The open space now boasts a children's play area, Multi-Use Games Area (MUGA) and outdoor gym after 80% of respondents from three local schools supported the designs.

Visitors will also benefit from the FA 'Playzones' after the council secured £250k from the Football Foundation as well as a new Sustainable Urban Drainage Systems (SuDS), soft landscaping, footways and park Leader Cllr Peray Ahmet joined Cabinet Members and the community to celebrate the official opening of the codesigned facilities.

Wood Green Common is part of a set of council-delivered projects to improve the biodiversity, ecology and facilities within local green spaces, promote walking and cycling and tackle poor air quality.

Other such projects that have already been successfully completed include the refurbishment of Caxton Gardens and the School Streets at St Paul's Catholic Primary School and Noel Park Primary School.



LEISURE MILESTONE CELEBRATED

Residents across the borough are benefitting from the continuing transformation of leisure centres one year on from bringing them back under our control.

We are investing £3.6m to improve the buildings and equipment at Broadwater Farm Community Centre, Park Road Leisure Centre & Lido and Tottenham Green Leisure Centre.

At Park Road, covers have been installed on the ever-popular Lido to help conserve energy and make the site more sustainable.

The teaching pool has also been completely refurbished and renovated, with repair works done to fix a major leak. The soft play has been refurbished for our youngest residents.



At Tottenham Green, the health suite, sauna and soft play have all had repairs and upgrades.

And across the sites, we've fixed lockers and taps, repaired the lighting and the showers and redecorated the floors and the ceilings across the board. In total, we've made more than 160 repairs across the four sites this past year alone.

The feedback we've received has indicated residents have noticed a distinct upgrade in cleanliness and the quality of facilities. The hard work will continue to give our residents leisure provision they can be proud to use.

WORLD CAR FREE DAY MARKED AT NEW SCHOOL **STRFFTS**



Thousands of children in Haringey enjoyed safer and healthier journeys to school on World Car Free Day.

Cabinet Members joined teachers and pupils to celebrate the occasion at one of Haringey's newest School Streets at Bounds Green Infants and Juniors.

This scheme and another at Welbourne Primary in Tottenham launched at the beginning of this term are transforming the start and end of the school day and take the borough's tally to an impressive 35 School Streets.

In total, more than 17.000 children at 44 educational establishments are benefitting from pedestrian and cycles zones spanning almost 12.6km during drop-off and pick-up times.

School Streets encourage more children to travel to and from school on foot, bike or scooter in a safe, fun and active way, cutting air pollution and creating a more pleasant environment at the school gates.

Only people walking, cycling

and wheeling, and those with vehicle exemption permits, are eligible to enter the zone while



the School Street is in operation.

MINISTER UNVEILS REFURBISHED **MUSWELL HILL LIBRARY**

We unveiled the impressive refurbishment of Muswell Hill Library and welcomed Baroness Fiona Twycross to see the transformation in October.

The upgrade boasts a new lift and accessible toilets as well as a reconfigured floorplan.

New bespoke lighting and furniture has been installed, alongside a complete redecoration of the library's interior. A designated area has been created for local young people to learn and study.



The improvements are part of our £4.9m investment to enhance library provision across the borough.

Haringey residents have also been given increased certainty over the availability of library provision across the borough after new opening hours were launched in October.

HARINGEY STANDS UNITED FOR HATE CRIME **AWARENESS WEEK**

A unified and multi-faith event in the heart of Haringey marked the start of National Hate Crime Awareness Week in the borough.

Leader Cllr Peray Ahmet joined community representatives, faith leaders and residents for the 'Faith in Unity: Standing Together Against Hate in Haringey' workshop at George Meehan House in Wood Green.

Attendees learned about the great collaborative and collective work we're doing to tackle bigotry, discrimination and racism in the borough.

It was one of a number of informative, insightful and inspiring activities and events on hate crime awareness that took place throughout the week.

There was an online training session for Haringey teachers and school support staff called 'From Conflict to Connection: Tackling Hate Speech and Polarisation in Classrooms.'

Another NHCAW-related. online training session entitled 'Justice for D/deaf & Disabled victims of hate crime: A focus on Haringey' for community groups,

professionals and the public was delivered by Disability Action Haringey.

This event was bookended by Follow Your Art by Pauline workshops at Wood Green Library and Hornsey Library respectively.

'DAY OF ACTION' FOR NORTHUMBERLAND PARK RESIDENTS

Northumberland Park residents had the opportunity to raise local issues with Haringey Council staff and the police during a dedicated 'Day of Action.'

Deputy Leader Cllr Sarah Williams joined officers to hear concerns at the pop-up engagement stalls behind the Neighbourhood Resource Centre (NRC).

The day saw several the council's service teams conduct joint patrols with the police and be stationed at the stalls.

Teams also worked together around the Rothbury Walk estate to deal with longstanding issues, clean up the area and meet the local community.

A repairs surgery took place in the NRC, while local residents could pick up a free food caddie and receive information about recycling throughout this Day of Action.

There was an estate walkabout and an anti social behaviour surgery in the NRC and cyclists could get security marking on their bikes for free.

BROADWATER FARM: A LEGACY OF CHANGE, A FUTURE OF OPPORTUNITY

October 2025 marks 40 years since the Broadwater Farm riots.

Once associated with difficult times, the estate has grown into a vibrant, diverse community full of energy, connection and hope.

A £250 million transformation is underway – the most ambitious in Broadwater Farm's history. But this isn't just about buildings. It's about people.

In the community centre, a group of older resident's line dance to Cameo's Candy.

After a healthy lunch, arts and crafts await. It's one of many events organised by local charity The Moselle Community Project to tackle social isolation.

"The estate has moved on, it has developed, it has changed. People want to look to the future," Nicolette Nicholls, Senior Project Manager, Moselle Community Project says.

Council Leader Cllr Peray Ahmet shares her pride: "I'm really proud that as a council we're investing over £200 million in the community and not just bricks and mortar. There are so many good things happening here – a wonderful school, the community centre and a vibrant spirit."

Clasford Stirling, a long-time community leader, reflects in a conversation with the BBC, who came to do a special feature on the transformation taking place on the estate: "We must

remember the past and learn from the mistakes that were made. I'm proud of what we've achieved here. Many estates have copied what we started. That's the future – there's no going back."

Maureen Duncan, Head of the Brooks Primary Secondary School – part of the Broadwater Farm Inclusive Learning Community comments: "We're really proud to be a part of the local community. We're located in the heart of Broadwater Farm and really feel a part of it. We believe our children breathe life, vigour and energy into the estate."

Among those younger voices is Nasim Khalam, co-founder of Reel Cinematic Focus, a production company born on the estate. "When I came here, you hear the negative stereotypes," he said to the BBC. "But the first day I moved in, my neighbours introduced themselves. We're friends to this day—they're part of my production company."

Such testimonies are naturally a source of pride to the initiative's

co-founder and trustee, Darren Wiltshire, who also operates as Estudiantes' Chief Executive Officer (CEO).

However, Wiltshire isn't one to rest on his laurels, preferring instead to surge on ahead and scale up however best they can despite their limited resources.

"The methodology is a fantastic one and I'm trying my best to make it work," Darren says. "But, for whatever reason, it just feels like it's not quite there. I'm constantly thinking about where I want it to be.

"People tell me I've got to be satisfied with the progress we are making, but I've got aspirations for where I want to take the programme. We're making progress and developing a reputation for what we're doing, and I think it's still got great potential!"



FINDING HOME IN HARINGEY

Residents share what a proper home means to them.

Here in Haringey, we're on track to deliver 1,000 new, high-quality council homes this year, a major milestone in our commitment to providing more affordable housing for local people.

We've also announced a landmark £600 million investment to enhance the comfort and quality of our 20,000 existing council homes over the next decade. This includes upgraded kitchens and bathrooms and improvements like insulation, new windows and doors to make homes safer and more energy-efficient to live in.

Residents tell us that the impact goes beyond just having more space, it's about having a place that works for their needs.

A HOME THAT FITS

Ms Mohamoud's daughter has complex health requirements, and finding suitable accommodation had been an ongoing struggle for the family.

"When I saw the finished look with all the changes I had requested, I couldn't believe my eyes, it brought me to tears and most definitely left me gobsmacked. We finally realised at that point it was going to be our happy home; the children and I couldn't wait to decorate their spacious rooms."

Having a home designed around her family's specific requirements meant everything to them.

HOME COMFORTS

In Wood Green, residents like Mr Mahmud are already seeing the difference with improvements. "The old bathroom pod was cramped, awkward to move around in and not very practical for day-to-day use. The new pod has completely changed that. It's spacious, much easier to access, and everything is set up in a way that works ... that makes life simpler and more comfortable."

PEACE OF MIND

For Dhanmatti in Seven Sisters, accessibility wasn't just about getting around, it was about independence. Through the Neighbourhood Moves Scheme, she found a home that transformed her daily life. "My new home gives me total peace of mind. I can now wake up like a sleeping beauty. It's wheelchair accessible, has a blue badge parking space and even an electric vehicle charging point."


Having a home designed from the ground up with accessibility in mind has helped how she lives day to day.

WHAT HOME REALLY MEANS

Gillian, who will soon move into Wingspan Walk, is one of many residents whose lives are being transformed by our housing programme in Tottenham Hale. "We will have a brand-new space, a bigger bedroom, a balcony, and triple glazing. Really looking forward to a bit of peace and quiet."

She joins residents like Ms Mohamoud and Dhanmatti, now living in new council homes that meet their unique needs as part of our plans to build 3,000 new homes by 2031.

Every week, 28 after-school music groups run by Haringey Music Service rehearse across Haringey



EVA LAVERTY


"I first played percussion when I joined the Haringey Young Musicians Percussion Ensemble in 2010.



This year, creative and cultural hub Jacksons Lane in Highgate turns 50. Once a derelict church, this muchloved arts centre began as a crazy idea dreamt up by residents. Today, it is a state-of-the-art space with both an artistic and engagement programme that reflects the needs of residents. Here are memories from three people who have been on this journey:

Melian Mansfield, one of Jacksons Lane's founders, shows how the centre's community ethos was embedded right from the start:

"Nicky [Gavron] and I, and a few other people decided that we were going to make use of this building for the community, and that anyone could join, anyone could come along, with no restrictions and people could contribute whatever."

Jamie Beddard, who lived around the corner and later co-wrote and directed the sellout show Delicate here, reflects on how our diverse communities have helped make Jacksons Lane an inclusive space:

"It's somewhere I go to. Without overrating it, I always feel very comfortable here and in a lot of places you don't feel that comfortable. There's a diversity of people that come here. It's meaningful, do you know what

Cecily, a participant of our Older Adults programme, speaks of how the spirit in which we were founded remains today:

"There was great excitement in the street the day [Jacksons Lane] opened. My daughter was about three years old and so thrilled to be one of the first people through the door. I did dance and exercise classes here - it was a wonderful social idea then - and it still is."

To celebrate the 50th anniversary, Jacksons Lane has put together an oral history collection that brings together voices from across the decades, from founders and performers to staff, volunteers, and community members. You can explore the collection at

SUPPORTING CHANGE FROM WITHIN THE COMMUNITY

BUBIC is a grassroots organisation founded by former drug users from Tottenham, dedicated to tackling the challenges faced by the local community. Their work focuses on engaging individuals who may be harder to reach, offering support and quidance.

BUBIC work in partnership with Haringey Council, the police and many other voluntary organisations.

Now in their 25th year, Lanre Babalola, the co-founder of BUBIC, shares their story with us.

"I come from a substance misuse and incarcerated background. I met my co-founder Ronnie Duberry in treatment.



All we knew was that we wanted the opportunity to help people along with their recovery journey.



former drug line. When people called, we'd say we don't sell drugs no more but come to this group we've got.

"We used my front room, and Ronnie's front room for meetings and then eventually we used the Eric Allen community space. Now we have our own space on Bruce Grove with over 20 staff, volunteers and

"There's a quote - 'every saint has a past. Every sinner has a future' - we stand up for those that are in an active addiction, but we also stand up for those in recovery.

"If you want to stop, we'll give you the opportunity and the motivation to change your behaviours. Some people may relapse, but we're here for them.

"We decided to say, you know what, no more criminal activity, no violence, and no more substance misuse. We came together as a collective to support each

"When we first started, we had nothing. We just had ourselves and a phone number. The phone number that we had was a

They can come back to where they left off when they are ready.

"We're from the community. Our friends are from the community. This substance doesn't care where you come from, and it's affected me, some of my staff members and even my own son. One of the things that BUBIC stands out for is our community.

"We encourage and support exusers to become peer mentors and advisors to help those who are addicted to drugs recognise the causes and effect of their addiction and to give them practical advice and emotional support to combat their addiction.

"Over the last 25 years we've supported more than 10,000 people. If you, or anyone you know is addicted to drugs or affected by someone else's addiction then BUBIC can help."

COMPASSION IN ACTION

A DAY IN THE LIFE OF OUR SOCIAL WORKERS

Every day, social workers across Haringey quietly transform lives. For carers, often juggling emotional, physical, and financial pressures, social workers are a lifeline, offering guidance, support, and a steady hand in times of uncertainty.

We spoke to Eucharia Sigba, Senior Practitioner, and Laura Kisz, Social Work Officer in Adult Social Services, to get a glimpse into their world. Their stories reveal the compassion, resilience, and dedication behind the scenes.



At Haringey's Central Front Door, unpredictability is the norm. Eucharia's mornings begin with team huddles and case updates, but the day can quickly shift

"Within this time, I could be responding to a crisis, supporting a carer or family member, advocating for someone, or chasing up referrals in our backlog," she explains. "It's fast-paced, but every action matters."

Laura adds, "Some days I'm the duty worker, which means urgent welfare visits, risk assessments, and making sure we respond quickly and effectively."

MOMENTS THAT MATTER

One case that stayed with Eucharia involved a young carer supporting her mother through mental health challenges. "She was missing school and overwhelmed. By working with the school, arranging respite, and validating her feelings, I saw her confidence grow and her attendance improve. Her family began accepting support."

UNDERSTANDING THE WEIGHT CARERS CARRY

Carers often carry invisible burdens. "They rarely ask for help," says Eucharia. "Part of my role is to recognise their pain, link them with services, and let them know they're not alone. Empowering carers starts with listening without judgment."

Laura agrees: "Every person has a story. I make sure my assessments capture that story because every detail matters."



FINDING STRENGTH IN THE WORK

Despite the emotional toll, both find purpose in their roles. "Some stories stay with you," says Eucharia. "But knowing someone's voice is heard, that a carer feels supported, that's what keeps me going."

Laura adds, "I love that Haringey is so diverse. Working with people from all backgrounds is a privilege."

LOOKING AFTER THEMSELVES AND EACH OTHER

Wellbeing is essential in this demanding field. Eucharia reflects, "I set aside time to disconnect and reset through supervision, peer support, or just a walk after a hard day. We carry each other along."

FINAL THOUGHTS

"Social work isn't just about supporting people," says Eucharia. "It's about walking with them, challenging inequality, and advocating for dignity and justice."

Social workers are more than professionals, they're anchors of hope. Behind every carer is a network of support, and at its heart are people who care deeply.

An innovative partnership between Haringey Council, Thames Water, and software and data analytics company Policy in Practice has helped thousands of local families access vital support with rising water bills - saving residents over £696,000 so far.

With water bills increasing by an average of £123 (26%) across the sector in the past year, this initiative brings much-needed relief to households on the lowest incomes.

Using secure data sharing, eligible residents are automatically enrolled into Thames Water's affordability schemes with no application needed.

DEVELOPING SKILLS AND STRENGTHS BEYOND THE CLASSROOM



At Haringey Learning Partnership (HLP), providing opportunities outside the classroom are not just an add-on - it's a core part of the curriculum, embedded into every student's experience.

For many young people at HLP, mainstream education did not offer the chance to explore the city of London, take part in creative workshops, or travel abroad.

Here, those opportunities are not only available but they're also transformative.

Enrichment at HLP plays a vital role in building trust between students and staff, improving behaviour, and reducing exclusions.

From sailing on West Reservoir to crafting theatre props with the Royal Academy of Dramatic Art, students engage in hands-on learning that boosts confidence and nurtures ambition. Financial literacy sessions with WizeUp and other practical workshops help prepare them for life beyond school.

One standout initiative is Generation Exchange, a partnership with a local charity that brings together students and older members of the community at a local venue.

Each week, respite students cook, play games, and share stories with older residents. These intergenerational afternoons foster empathy, communication, and a sense of belonging. Students gain a deeper understanding of their community and themselves.

One participant said, "We're changing our culture because we come from all different places. It's a meeting of minds from different generations."

With the support from a wide range of community-based partner organisations, students at HLP have been given the opportunity to experience exciting and life changing residential trips abroad.

Over the past year, students have travelled to Paris, Barcelona, and Berlin - often for the first time. These experiences broaden horizons and spark curiosity about the wider world. But the benefits go far beyond sightseeing.

As Head of Science Gemma Short explains, the trips help students prepare for post-16 education by building independence and self-belief. "If you can navigate a foreign city and communicate in another language, you can face the challenges of college," she says.

At HLP, enrichment is about more than activities - it's about empowerment. Staff are dedicated to supporting students, helping them build the confidence to reintegrate into mainstream education, tackle GCSEs, or take the next step into college. These experiences show students what's possible as well as remind them that they have the strength to succeed.

A year 11 student said: "I think it's important because it pushes people out of their comfort zone and makes them do things they wouldn't usually do. It's the thrill afterwards that they get that could also push them to want to do better in their exams because they're used to being put in uncomfortable situations."

With continued commitment to enrichment, Haringey Learning Partnership is not just educating students - it's inspiring futures.



I WISH IT COULD BE... CHRISTMAS EVERY DAY

As we get ready for the festive season, Deborah Hedgecock unveils some Christmas trivia from Haringey's past

With slight reference to the glam rock band Wizzard's lyrics, if your surname was Christmas, then it certainly could be 'Christmas every day' in your household. However uncommon we think this name might be, historically there were a surprising number of Christmases living in Haringey. Delving into local records, the 1898 Directory shows five Christmas households alone.

Homing in on the list there is Mr W. D. Christmas of Moselle House at 707 High Road in

Tottenham. In the 1901 census, there were eight members of the Christmas family living in this grand old house. William Durrant Christmas and his grown-up sons were stockbroker clerks. His wife was Mary Christmas.

Another Christmas from Tottenham was Frederick James Christmas. In the '1939 Register', he was a photographic camera maker and repairer at 77 The Crescent, South Tottenham. We also learn he was born on Christmas Day c.1870.

At St Mary's Parish Church, Hornsey, back in 1877 there was A. Mary Christmas (Annie Mary) who was baptised. She was the daughter of another William and his wife Annie Christmas.

Another local Christmas family event at St Mary's church saw a wedding taking place on Christmas Day – this time in 1923 with the marriage of Doris Christmas of 20 Campsbourne Road, Hornsey to Thomas Cherry.

Although unusual today, getting married on Christmas Day was a popular tradition during the 18 and 19th centuries - even into the 20th century. This was not for romantic or festive sentiment, but quite practical reasons, often out of necessity. For working-class couples and their families, Christmas and Boxing Day were the only days of the year they could get time off. If Christmas and Boxing Day were also followed by a Sunday, then that was an even greater treat to have three days of family time together for celebration.

In church registers we find another happy Christmas occasion at Holy Trinity Church, Tottenham Green in 1910, when Annie May Christmas married Thomas Robinson on Christmas Day. Annie was the daughter of James and Ann Christmas. Newly married, Annie no longer lived at the family home of 14 High Cross Road. There were still several Christmases living here in the 1911 census. Her father James was a boot repairer, whilst her

younger siblings worked in a sweet factory or as a 'shop boy.'

In 1971, W. Martin wrote a delightful memoir about his Tottenham childhood, including recollections of shops, businesses, local characters and neighbours. His family happened to know the Christmases of High Cross Road:

"A few yards further on from the Rose and Crown pub, down High Cross Road, lived 'Daddy Christmas' whose abode was one of a row of old wooden houses. Mr Christmas was a cobbler who was, in his youth, apprenticed to my

grandfather, James Carey. The whole Christmas family were also friends of ours and one of his daughters was a Mrs Street, known in the district for her services as a midwife."

Looking through the records, archives and historical collections at Bruce Castle Museum & Archive can often uncover some unusual stories. Whether it is a one-name study, the history of your house or street, or some ancestry research, put it on your New Year resolution list to check out what you can find amongst the archives at Bruce Castle.
