Remember you are choosing a school for the next 5-7 years for the teenager they will become


Weigh it up and make a list of MUST haves and WOULD LIKE to haves

Places in special schools are only offered to children without EHCPs in exceptional circumstances What are your aspirations for your child – academic qualifications or independence skills?


Does the current school meet your child's learning needs in line with their peers?






An inclusive community hub in Haringey where people can play, socialise and get information and support

What is **SENDIASS** – overview

Special Educational Needs and Disabilities Information Advice and Support Service

The Government's **SEND Code of Practice** requires every Local Authority to fund a free **information advice and support service** for parents/carers and children and young people with SEND, covering: special educational needs, disability, health and social care

The remit of **SENDIASS**

To support parents/carers, and young people with special educational needs up to age 25 with:

- Initial concerns or identification of potential SEN or disabilities, through to ongoing support and provision, which may include an Education Health and Care (EHC) plan
- Understanding local policy and practice around SEND
- Navigating the Local Authority's SEND Local Offer
- Guidance about the law on SEN and disability, health and social care, including Personal Budgets
- Gathering, understanding and interpreting information and applying it to their own situation
- Information on the local authority's processes for resolving disagreements, its complaints procedures and means of redress

SENDIASS must:

- Be impartial and provided at arm's length from the local authority
- Be free, accurate, confidential, and accessible
- Work in partnership with children, young people, parents, local authorities, CCGs and other relevant partners
- Help to promote independence and self-advocacy for children, young people and parents
- Provide advice through individual casework and work with parent carer support groups, local SEN youth forums, disability groups, or training events
- Work with the local Parent Carer Forum and other representative user groups to ensure that the views and experiences of children, young people and parents inform policy and practice

Haringey SEND Information Advice & Support Service



Markfield is commissioned by Haringey Council to provide the SENDIASS service for this borough

- Markfield SENDIASS provides parents and young people with SEND who live in Haringey with free impartial information advice and support,
- Markfield SENDIASS Advisers are all trained in SEN law (IPSEA training)
- SENDIASS is a self-referral service, which can be accessed in a variety of ways.....

- Impartial advice on SEND procedures and law

- Signpost and information about other SEND-related services in Haringey

Decide on your preference of school

Remember: The most important factor is how you and your child feel about the school. Can you picture your child there?

It may not be the school your friend recommended or chose, but is it right for your child and your family?

We often make these decisions on a gut feeling, and as long as you have collected good evidence along the way, hopefully it will be the right decision. Good luck!

It is important to select more than one school as your top preference is not guaranteed. Schools prioritise children with EHCPs but need to consider everyone who applies to be sure they can meet all the children's needs.



UNDERSTAND THE APPLICATION PROCESS



If your child is at SEN Support..

Apply through school admissions http://www.haringey.gov.uk/children-andfamilies/schools-and-education/schooladmissions

The process will be the same as for all other children. You will find out the school you have been offered on 1st March 2024



If your child has an EHCP...

If your child has an EHCP, you will have had or be having an annual review in Summer Term Year 5 or early Year 6. This will be used to update your child's EHCP so that the new school has a good understanding of them. You will get a copy of this before it is sent to any new schools

It is important to make sure their new EHCP reflects the person they are now so that the new school can make a really good decision about whether they can meet their needs

By the middle of September, you will be sent by post a blue form which you will need to fill in and email or post back to Haringey SEND department stating up to two school preferences. Your SENDCo will be able to help you with this

For children with EHCPs, as soon as you return the blue form we will send your paperwork to the secondary schools you have expressed a preference for.

If you have not expressed a preference for your local school, we also send your child's paperwork to them.

You will hear from us which school your child has been allocated by February 15th 2024



If your child is given a place at a special school, they may be eligible for transport support, but you will need to apply for this separately

Transport support comes in a number of forms:

- Bus or coach transport with escort
- Travel buddying and travel assistance
- Travel training

What happens when your child's school has been agreed...

The primary and secondary school will work together to support your child to settle in well to their new school. This could include:

 A transition review with you, the primary school and your child's new secondary school to agree their support plan.
An induction programme consisting of a number of additional visits and taster day or summer school

The Inclusion team will deliver a workshop with top tips for you next year
