# Haringey Safety Valve Programme Progress Update

September 2024







# **Safety Valve Programme Approach**

Haringey Council continues to deliver on its Safety Valve Programme, maintaining its commitment to managing the demand for Education, Health, and Care Plans (EHCPs) through earlier intervention and support for children with SEND in Haringey.

The Safety Valve programme is being implemented to transform the Special Educational Needs and Disabilities (SEND) system by creating more effective systems and processes.

# **Background Information: Safety Valve Workstreams**

Haringey Council's SEND system, Workstream A, aims to reduce EHCPs by implementing early intervention strategies and aligning demand with London and national averages. The key components of Workstream A include:

**Enhanced Speech and Language Therapy**: Ongoing investments are being made in early intervention services to address speech and language needs more effectively.

**SEMH Pathways Review**: Development of Social Emotional and Mental Health pathways, **Supported Internship Programs**: A robust initiative to prioritize preparation for adulthood through the creation of supported internships, equipping young people with essential skills for future success.

**Annual Reviews**: Focused efforts on the effective use of annual reviews to potentially conclude EHCPs where suitable, and to accurately identify the needs for additional health and social care funding and support.

# **Background Information: Safety Valve Workstreams**

Haringey Council's Workstream B is progressing as planned, focusing on mitigating budgetary pressures within the Special Educational Needs and Disabilities (SEND) framework.

The key initiatives under this workstream include:

- Comprehensive Review of SEND Bandings and Top-Ups: The Council have reviewed the Bandings and Top-Ups system and the new Bandings will be implemented from September 2024
- Capital Investments for Additional SEND Placements The Council continues to work towards delivering the additional 118 new SEND school places with the new ASC Resource Provision in Earlsmead, opened in September 2024.
- Commissioning Projects: There are ongoing projects aimed at streamlining the
  procurement processes, specifically addressing the issues related to the extended use of
  spot purchasing and improving the coordination between annual review processes and the
  specific arrangements for individual children.

## **Background Information: Safety Valve Workstreams**

Haringey Council's Workstream C has successfully delivered most of its projects, which are now making a significant impact.

**Enhanced Collaboration**: Strengthening partnerships with parents, carers, and schools, recognising their crucial role in ensuring a more integrated approach to service delivery.

- 1. Lean Process Mapping: Streamlining SEND services to improve efficiency and effectiveness, reducing unnecessary delays and optimising resources.
- 2. More comprehensive Workforce Development: Investing in the professional development of the workforce to better meet the diverse needs of SEND students through skilled and knowledgeable staff.
- 3. Coherent Application of SEND Core Standards: Ensuring consistent application of standards across all levels of SEND services to guarantee quality education and support for all students.
- 4. Improved Communication: Enhancing the transparency and accessibility of information regarding the education options ordinarily available to families will make it easier for them to make informed decisions about their children's education.

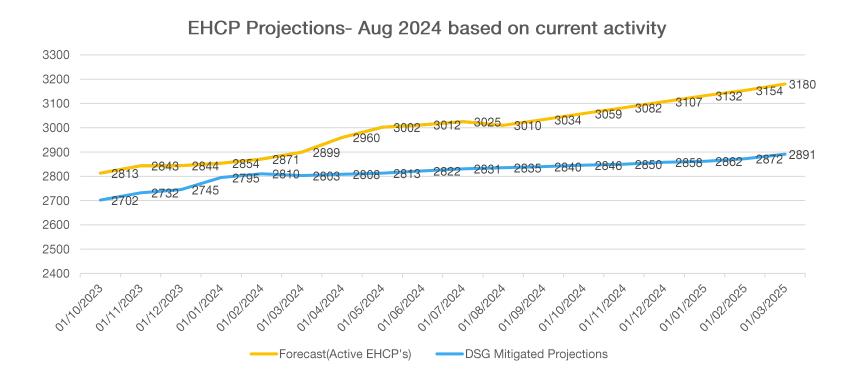

#### Safety Valve Measure- Forecast EHCP's to 31 August 2024

Haringey's DSG Plan submitted in January 23 forecasts that by 31 March 2025 there will be 2,891 active EHC Plans after mitigation.

As at the August 2024, Haringey had 3,010 active EHC Plans, however the DSG Plan forecast that as of August 2024, Haringey projected to have 2,835 active EHCPs. Currently Haringey is 175 active EHCP's over target.

It is recognised that there is the potential for more closures of EHCP's for Post-16 young adults no longer continuing in education.

These efforts will expand from September 2024 onwards.</li> <li>Development of Educational Pathways: Continual efforts to refine early years and primary educational pathways are ongoing, ensuring continued progress in these areas.</li> </ul>

All staff positions are filled, and children requiring support and intervention have been identified.</li> <li>Specialist Direct Pathway Established: All new requests for specialist direct support are being addressed through an established and fully operational direct pathway.</li> <li>Continuous Implementation and Review: The model was fully implemented during 2023-2024, and continuous evaluation and dedicated efforts are underway to further enhance its effectiveness.</li> </ul>
Project A.3  Increase capacity of mainstream schools to meet the needs with SEMH	<ul> <li>Service Mapping Progress: The meticulous mapping process for existing services is now complete, it will be used as toolkit to help roll out the new Graduated Response Pathway.</li> <li>New SEMH Pathway Development: A new SEMH pathway designed to support children has now been finalised, and it is planned to be operational in schools starting in September of this year.</li> </ul>
Project A.4  Thresholds and Annual Reviews of EHCP's	<ul> <li>EHCP Training Rollout: Successfully delivered training sessions on thresholds and continuous health funding.</li> <li>Completion of Annual Reviews: Annual reviews for the designated 12-month period continue to be completed.</li> <li>Overall Delivery: The planned activities for the EHCP training rollout were executed as scheduled.</li> </ul>

Project A.5  Supported Internships	<ul> <li>Expansion of SI Programmes with Local Businesses: The project has been successful in securing SI placements for 36 additional students this year, aiming to reach 79 students by the 2024/25 academic year.</li> <li>Engagement with Disability Confident Employers: To develop additional placements, efforts are ongoing to engage potential employers in the scheme. The programme is on track to have 12 interns and 6 pre-interns within Haringey Council.</li> </ul>
Project A.6  Early Years	<ul> <li>Drafting of New EY SEND Bandings: Successfully completed the drafting of new Early Years Special Educational Needs and Disabilities (EY SEND) bandings for engagement and testing.</li> <li>Public Consultation on EY SEND Bandings: Accomplished the public consultation phase for the proposed EY SEND bandings.</li> <li>Review and Development of Funding Models: A thorough review of the current EY SEND funding model has been completed, and draft options for potential future funding models have been developed. Financial modelling and a review of financial and EHCP targets are in progress and required to finalise future funding proposals.</li> </ul>
Project B.1, B.3 and B.7  Capital Projects	<ul> <li>Alexandra Primary: For Primary SEMH with 10 places, a separate cohort meeting is set for profiling and matching, with surveys by contractors planned. Opening targeted for September 2025.</li> <li>Earlsmead Primary: For Primary ASC with 15 places, design work is in progress. Additional meetings are planned around cohort organization and sensory room development. Will now open in September 2024.</li> <li>The Brook: For Primary ASC and learning disability with 10 places, project timelines are being established for temporary and modular buildings, with an opening planned for September 2025.</li> <li>Proposed Secondary SEMH site: Governors meeting has taken place. Funding agreement has been drafted by legal to ensure enabling works can be complemented.</li> <li>Secondary ASC site with 34 places, confirmed to move forward on the 22<sup>nd</sup> of May, also additional secondary site for ASC for phase two has been scoped out with a visit due to take place on the 6<sup>th</sup> of June</li> <li>Riverside: For Secondary and Post-16 ASC and learning disability with 15 places is now complete.</li> </ul>

Project B.2 Cost-effective commissioning and brokerage of services	<ul> <li>Financial Oversight and Quality Improvement: Early detection of overspending and quality issues has driven efficiencies and ensured value for money.</li> <li>Commissioning Team Efforts: The commissioning team is finalising negotiations through Service Level Agreements with 3 schools to ensure a fair and robust funding model as they move towards opening and mobilisation.</li> <li>Development of Brokerage and Quality Frameworks: The brokerage function is operational, and a new brokerage officer is in post.</li> <li>Education Commissioning Framework Development: A tuition business case is being drafted, and data is being collated to assess primary home tuition needs and other factors.</li> <li>Standardised contracts and specifications are now being generated for new providers, existing providers, and longer-term commissioning requirements.</li> <li>Identifying opportunities to commission under new contractual arrangements: To help deliver better value-formoney returns, a revised list of new contracting arrangements for specific services, such as home tuition services, faith schools, and the top six highest-spend providers, is being developed.</li> </ul>	
Project B.5 Commissioning Post 16 Learners	<ul> <li>Completion of Business Case: The business case for the tuition services framework is now near completion.</li> <li>Review high-cost pre-16 placements with INMS providers: Work is ongoing to determine entering into new contractual arrangements at reduced costs with some INMS Providers, particularly those that listed in the new prospectus.</li> <li>New Services / Pre /Post 16 prospectus - Will help track and provide high-quality placement offers for SEND Learners.</li> </ul>	
Project B.6 Remodel financial support/ top ups to mainstream and special schools	<ul> <li>Review of SEND Sufficiency Funding: Following the establishment of the new bandings, a comprehensive review of the Special Educational Needs and Disabilities (SEND) Bandings has been completed and approved following public consultation.</li> <li>Project Timeline: These changes are scheduled to start in the new academic year beginning September 2024.</li> </ul>

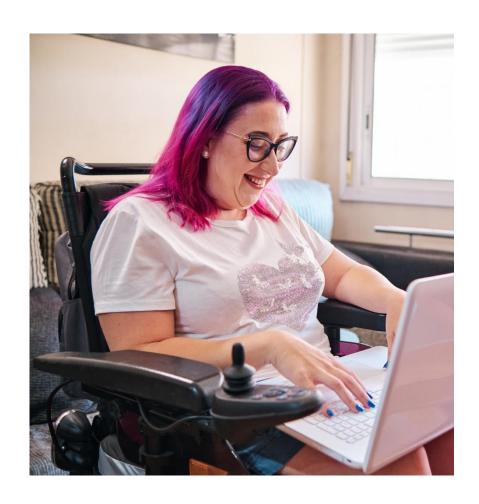
